Who We Are.....

Thank you for reading our Club Newsletter! Here's a little bit about our organization. We are a global women's organization whose members work to improve the lives of women and girls through programs leading to social and economic empowerment. Soroptimist programs focus on providing women and girls with access to education, which is one of the most effective ways to end social problems disproportionately affecting women and girls.

Soroptimist International (SI) has consultative status with the United Nations' (U.N.) Economic and Social Council, which oversees U.N. activities and policies promoting human rights. It is in this forum that Soroptimist representatives can advocate for the Soroptimist mission of improving the lives of women and girls.



This year, we were all presented with unique challenges due to COVID-19. Nonetheless, Soroptimist International Placerville (SIP) maintained its focus on the community by **raising over \$25,000 at our annual fundraiser**; **committing \$10,000 from our general fund toward COVID relief, including \$5,000 directly to the Marshall Foundation For Community Health and their COVID-19 Fund**, which provides a direct match of donations to assist with a broad spectrum of COVID-related needs within Marshall Hospital and the local community; **sending out over 100 books to foster children in the county**; and **providing scholarships for college-bound women in the community**.



Reflections on 2019-2020 from President Lynne

What a wild, strange year Club Year 2019-2020 was! Days long power outages that seemed always to occur through a meeting day; a Chocolate Affair planning meeting by lamplight; a public gathering that had to be moved outside because of an outage, and a pandemic that required us to completely alter our meetings and activities beginning in March. I guess we should be grateful that December, January, and February were mostly quiet, but we hardly noticed as we tried to catch up on our Chocolate Affair planning.



All the same, we did get quite a bit accomplished this year.

In **June**, we attended a Placerville City Council meeting where we partnered with Judy Knapp to inform the council about the Human Trafficking Awareness instruction we assisted with at Herbert Green Middle School.

July saw ten of us at the SDR in Reno, including new member Julia. We got some great ideas for fundraising and had a wonderful time!

In **September**, we had our Chocolate Affair Planning Retreat. We also started our establishment of a clothes closet at Marshall Hospital, founded especially for victims of Human Trafficking.

In **October**, we held a Club Retreat to plan for the coming year. Some of us attended the District 3 meeting in Cameron Park. And then...the power outages started. They disrupted a couple meetings in October, but the show went on for our Fire Insurance Program on the 29th. Despite a major outage, we met in the Gazebo of the Library and had a successful event!

November had a few more outage disruptions, but some members managed to get to SI Hanford's Festival of Trees fundraiser to support the Club and explore possibly doing one ourselves.

In **December** we had several events. We held our joint fundraiser with the Lions in support of the Brian Ishmael fund. We also wrapped books and candy for the CASA Christmas party, and as a side benefit, the effort also brought us our newest member, Amy! Our Christmas Party at Judy's beautiful house was also the scene for inducting our new member, Stacey!

In **January**, it was full steam ahead on the Chocolate Affair, and just like every year, we began to think we would never pull it off! (Spoiler alert: It was very successful!) Also in January, several members presented Human Trafficking Awareness Training to El Dorado Transit at their request. We also inducted new member Kathi!

In **February**, we welcomed hundreds of guests to the 22st Annual Chocolate Affair. How lucky we were to have our major fundraiser be a success before big groups were banned early the very next month due to the pandemic.

March, April and May, we began to meet via Zoom. During this period, we agreed to take \$10,000 from the building fund for Corona-virus pandemic relief, and allocated \$5,000 of that to the Marshall Foundation For Community Health for COVID related supplies for the hospital and the community. We received exciting news that the Lyon's Foundation awarded us a \$5,000 grant due to a nomination from a former member. We also contributed to a welcoming interview room for human trafficking victims in Sacramento.

AND, lest you think I have forgotten, in our spare time, we:

- Disbursed nearly \$22,000 in Helping Hands funds;
- Awarded eight Scholarships and Awards for a total of \$11,500;
- Welcomed four new members; and
- Greatly increased our presence on social media, principally thanks to Debbie!

It was a wild and strange year, but I think we made a difference to women and girls in our community...and that's our real goal.

After a reduced meeting schedule in the summer, Club Year 2020-2021 finds us still meeting by Zoom, but ready to resume our work with renewed enthusiasm. It will be a challenging year, since the pandemic is still with us, but I have great confidence that we can still fulfill our vision of helping women and girls achieve their full potential.

Our Signature Program

Helping Hands provides funds for women experiencing emergencies. Through partnerships with many local agencies, we provide financial assistance to help women and their families.

During Club Year 2019-2020, we gave **39 grants** totaling approximately **\$21,500** to local non-profits and county agencies to help them provide their clients with needed services that would otherwise "fall through the gaps." You can imagine the joy we feel to know that we helped **39 families** secure



employment, reach educational goals, or stay in their home. This assistance also helped **51 children** to maintain stability and continue to reach their full potential. Here is what we funded:

(16) Rental Assistance payments, to help families to stay in their homes



(6) PG&E and Utility Bills paid

(1) Water Pipe Repair, for hospice patient

(1) Behavioral Health assistance
